As it has been British Science Week this week, all the classes took part in science events. Below is a link to the annual Science Week poster competition that some children might like to enter.



Classroom news:

Reception

In Reception, we are of course at the beginning of our writing journeys. Each day we teach phonics and reading and also have adult directed writing sessions. It is wonderful then to see the Reception pupils writing out of choice, using the skills they have gained over time. With perfect timing for Comic

Relief, Peregrine wrote her own joke: The cat sat on the bin, it is very smelly. Notice the brilliant use of a capital letter, self-correcting and a full stop at the end of the sentence. Most of all it is a <u>very</u> funny joke which she devised herself and wrote out for us all to enjoy.



Years 1 and 2

We've had a very busy week with lots of whole school collaborative activities and outdoor learning. The week started with whole school Science morning to celebrate British Science Week, where all the children experimented with marbling, chromatography and the egg drop challenge. Year 1/2 and Year 2 had Forest School and thankfully the weather remained nice and dry as they built a nest for a bird and created dragons. Year 1s will have their session next week. To end the week, the whole school celebrated Red Nose Day, by either wearing red or having a wacky hair-do to raise money for Comic Relief. In Maths, Year 1s have been looking at weight using scales to work out the weight of certain objects and to draw comparisons with other objects. Year 2 have been looking at division and working out how this is connected to multiplication. They also looked at word

problems and explored whether they were asking them to divide or multiply. In English, all classes have looked at the story *George and the Dragon* by Chris Wormell as part of their module on dragon stories. Year 1s labelled a dragon and then used adjectives to describe the different features of the dragon. Year 2s recapped noun phrases and the suffix -ful and used these to describe the dragon. In Geography, all classes chose a country within the UK and created a fact file, including information about the capital city and the name of the main river that runs through that country. Well done for a hardworking week Key Stage One.

For Year 2s, please find attached number bonds to 19 and spellings practised from sessions of Phonics.

Year 3

This week Year 3 have worked really hard on rehearsing for our school production. In English lessons, the children planned and started to write their own dragon stories. We focused on money in our Maths sessions. The children started the week by ordering and subtracting amounts in pounds and pence. Later on in the week, the children revisited how to multiply and divide by 10 and 100 and used this knowledge to solve word problems involving money. The children really enjoyed making their sandwich designs in DT and grading them based on their textures, appearance, smell and taste.

Year 4

We have had a brilliant time this week practising for our play with Year 3. We celebrated Science Week with a range of activities, including creating marbled paper with oil and ink and dropping eggs from a height without breaking them. In Geography, we explored how water is recycled again and again and is cleaned through filtration. We created our own filters for cleaning dirty water with some impressive results! In Maths, we have continued with our shape topic, this week looking at different 3D shapes and their properties.

Year 5

Year 5 enjoyed starting the week with Science morning, exploring colour mixing through marbling and chromatography and the challenge of keeping an egg intact if dropped from a height. In the afternoon they walked to West Road Concert Hall and were able to listen to the talented orchestra perform music from films. In lessons this week, Year 5 have been planning and writing their own stories from a faraway setting, focusing on vivid language to describe settings and atmosphere. In Maths we have been looking at the equivalence between decimals and fractions and have been multiplying whole numbers by fractions.

Year 6

This week in Year 6, we have been doing division and multiplication in Maths. In English, we are writing short stories with tension and suspense. For Computing, we are preparing stop motion films for a film festival. Last, but not least, in Art we are continuing our Henri Rousseau acrylic paintings. By Elsa and Isabella
