Classroom news:

Reception

Having engaged in skipping, yoga and outdoor games, Reception tried out another type of exercise – riding on a balance bike. We talked about why it is important to wear a helmet and look ahead when riding a bike. It was a great fun to scoot, stride and glide. The class then went on to discuss bikes from the past and present, noticing the similarities and differences. We agreed that the bike nicknamed the 'Boneshaker' didn't sound too comfortable.



Years 1 and 2

We've had another busy and exciting week, learning to play 3 tees cricket, or for those who had swimming lessons, how to get help if you think you may be in trouble whilst in the water or how to help someone in the water in need of rescuing. All Year 2s practised calling out for help in their loudest voices. In Maths, Year 1s have been working on doubling and halving of numbers up to 20 and used their understanding of multiplication and division to write out number sentences next to these. Year 2s have been working on addition and subtraction word problems; addition and subtraction number sentences using 2-digit numbers and finally writing out the times next to analogue clocks to the nearest 5-minute

intervals. In English, Year 1s have been looking at the prefix un- and wrote out sentences thinking about the character of Betsey from Betsey's Birthday Surprise. Year 2s explored the past progressive and wrote out sentences to describe parts of Betsey's days. All classes then went on to create a plan in preparation for next week's Big Write, where all children will be creating their own chapter based on what they already know about Betsey's life. In Science, all classes explored the human body, labelled all the different parts and learnt about what their functions are. We ended the week with PSHE and all classes thought about any changes that are likely to take place in the not-too-distant future and how they can manage their emotions if these changes do make them feel worried. We spoke about how speaking to our friends and families can help, as can going for a walk and even doing some relaxing activities, such as mindfulness colouring and drawing. Well done for a brilliant week Key Stage One. There will be no spellings or division tests next week.

Year 3

Year 3 have had another busy week. In Maths, we focused on identifying and sorting 3D shapes and worked on telling the time in 12hr and 24hr clock. In English sessions the children enjoyed listening to a range of stories by Satoshi Kitamura. They summarised and compared what they had in common and wrote from the point of view of one of the main characters. In Science, the children enjoyed investigating whether or not children that have longer femurs can jump further. In our Art session, the children enjoyed creating their backdrops for their animations.

Year 4

In English, we have been writing our own poems, inspired by 'You Are' by Valerie Bloom. We worked really hard on our descriptive language and our use of expanded noun phrases to bring our poems to life, with some impressive results. In Maths, we have been using both expanded and compact addition and subtraction to solve money related questions, while in Science, we carried out an investigation to see whether the length of someone's femur affects how far they can jump. We really enjoyed our swimming session and our forest school afternoon, where we used rope to make swings in the trees.

Year 5

This week, Year 5 have started their English work on Classic Poetry by reading The Walrus and the Carpenter by Lewis Carroll; they analysed the features, answered comprehension questions, performed verses and wrote a dramatic article using the plot of the empty oyster shells as a news story. In Maths, they have worked on percentages, linking them to fractions and using them to find percentages of amounts. They have produced some incredible work in art, choosing their media and working from their photographs of the river to depict water. In Science, they learnt of all the benefits of exercise and collected data on the class' favourite forms of activity.

Year 6

♣ This week we have been very busy; in Maths, we had an old pupil from Newnham Croft called Isabel do an assembly. She did a 15 minute workshop with all the classes and solved maths problems. We have just finished: "There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom" and we reached 100 stars! ★ ★ In Masterchef, we made ice lollies and sold them on Thursday. Cambridge Open Studios 2023

Artists will once again be opening their studios to visitors for up to 4 weekends in July.

Locally there are 4 studios:

At 22 Marlowe Rd (no.69 in the guide) 2 artists will be exhibiting their work: Ruth Schmid upcycles materials to make unique and functional bags and accessories, and Sue Lawley is showing atmospheric contemporary oil paintings.

At 47 Granchester St Harriet Lintoff (no.68) will be showing her paintings of still life and landscape.

Neil Warmsley (no.2) will be showing his work and the gardens that inspire it at the Margaret Beaufort Institute, 12 Grange Road.

Rani Drew (no.70) at 10 Fulbrooke Rd paints landscapes and nature in vivid watercolours.
