Classroom news:

Reception

One of our current class books in Reception is Owl Babies by Martin Waddell and Patrick Benson. We have been focusing on many elements of the story but this week have been

We discussed the following vocabulary, thinking about what each word actually means: twigs, hunting ivy, silent, swooped and fuss. We have also been learning a poem called Breezy Weather and once again focused on the meaning of some of the words: breezy and huddled.

Years 1 and 2

This week, KS1 continued with their DT project, cutting and assembling their structure of the windmill they designed. In English, the children have been exploring poetry and practising performing a class poem with actions and prosody. As an extension to this, Year 2 have been starting to consider different rhymes for the poem Walking Around the Zoo. In Maths, Year 1s have been counting in 1s to 100 and working out missing numbers. They also finished the week by working out 1 more and 1 less with numbers to 100. In Year 2, the children have been working on using their knowledge of pairs to ten, to find the next multiple of ten. They continued to work on place value of 2-digit numbers, by working out the value of tens and ones in numbers. This progressed to children looking at 10 more and 10 less. In Geography, all classes created a map locating the key features of our playground. In Science, all children experimented with a selection of different socks to see how much they stretched. Subsequently they made a bar chart to show their results. Lastly, in PE all children continued practising doing a variety of jumps using equipment. They learnt how to safely take off and land. We'd like to remind all parents that your child's book from their Reading sessions this week have been uploaded to the Big Cat Collins e-book portal, so please ensure you're reading with them and if you have any issues logging in, please let us know. Well done for this week KS1!

Year 3

Year 3 have had another busy week. In Maths, the children have worked on addition problems involving known number facts. In English lessons, we have started a new poetry unit based on animals and the weather. The children enjoyed reciting The Bug Chant by Tony Mitton and thinking up actions to enhance their performances. In Geography the children enjoyed learning about Mount Etna and thinking about the positive and negative sides to living close to a volcano. In our Science lesson the children enjoyed using magnifying lenses to look closely at what things they could find in soil.

Year 4

In English, the children showed off their writing skills and vivid imaginations when they wrote their own opening to a suspenseful story in the style of The Iron Man. In Maths, we continued to work on securing our understanding of place value to 10,000 and began to focus on collecting and interpreting data. It would be good if you could support your child to practise counting in steps of 25s (and 250s). Please find attached the Year 4 spellings and some information about the spelling strategies that we are learning to help us with spelling practise. Don't forget that on Monday 2 October we are going to the Natural History Museum in London so your child will need to be in school by 8:40 on Monday for registration and will need to bring a packed lunch and drink with them.

Year 5

We have continued to explore two-place decimals in Maths this week, this time focusing on counting from zero to one in hundredths and subtracting decimals using the counting on method. In English, we have started work on our travel writing about an imagined trip to Ancient Greece, including our transport method, which part of Ancient Greece we will visit and what we will do and see there. In History, we explored different versions of the same myth and discussed why and how different versions may have developed over time.

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have been looking into algebra in Maths, including word problems. In English, they have writing in role as characters from the famous poem The Highwayman. In Science, Year 6 have been preparing and performing experiments by measuring shadows at different times of the day. So far this week it has not been sunny so we have started today. We have continued with cross-country in PE, but with some games too, e.g. dodgeball, home invasion and capture the flag. In History, Ancient Greece has carried on as the main topic, and now we are looking into the differences between Athens and Sparta. *By Sammy and Lucas*

In R.E. lessons this half term, Year 5 and Year 6 are thinking about the question, 'Why do people have to stand up for what they believe in?'
