## Classroom news

### Reception

The week started with an exciting bus trip to the Central Library for half of the class. The children were wonderfully behaved and did some amazing writing about their experience, sharing what they saw and how they felt. In maths, we have been learning number bonds to 10, using visual prompts and fun rhymes to help the children remember them. During PSHE, we have been talking about what makes a good friend, discussing kindness, sharing, and how to look after one another. Please remember to check your child's home folder and support them with writing their name using correct letter formation. Thank you for your continued support.

## Year 1

P.E. in Year 1 this half term has focused on two exciting areas. During Tuesday sessions with Mrs Roberts, the children have been developing their agility skills through fun games such as *Dragon's Nest*, *Destroy the Towers* and *Courtyard Dodgeball*. In Wednesday P.E. sessions with the class teacher, the focus has been on dance. The children have been responding creatively to a range of seasonal stimuli, and this week they worked together in unison to create a wave-inspired dance set in the summer.



## Year 2

Year 2 has had a busy and creative week. In English, the children completed their excellent slow rise stories, using rich vocabulary to help readers visualise their journey to Lammas Land. We then began our poetry unit, performing poems in groups and focusing on expression. We also went on a simile hunt around the school and worked together to write a group poem about our school. In art, the children created collaborative mono prints using carbon paper, experimenting with tone and mark making. In geography, we drew sketch maps and used OS maps to match symbols using a key. In maths, we used Venn and Carroll diagrams and finished our shape unit by learning about the properties of 2D shapes. We ended the week with a fantastic Forest School session! Well done, Year 2.

## Year 3

Year 3 has had a great week and really impressed in so many areas of their learning. In maths the children continued to work on multiplication and division problems. In English lessons the children gave some really inspiring, informative speeches about a subject of their choosing. They also really enjoyed creating calligrams on

words with opposite meanings and writing recounts about what life might be like living in Antarctica.

## Year 4

In English, we edited and produced the final version of the explanations for our amazing inventions. In maths, we practised adding fractions with the same denominator, giving answers in their simplest form, and converting between mixed numbers and improper fractions. We have also been learning the 7x and 9x facts. In science, we constructed circuits, this time introducing a switch and exploring how this works and why we need switches. In RE, we investigated different ceremonies of commitment. Spellings this week are words ending in -ous that include 'ge.'

## Year 5

Year 5 has had a very active week, with their third swimming session and a trip to The Whipple Museum to coincide with our learning about Space and Earth. In science, we have been exploring how day and night and the seasons occur, using models of the Sun and the Earth with a torch and ping-pong balls. In history, we explored the historical significance of Ranjit Singh. In RE, Year 5 has been looking at what funerals can mean in different worldviews. In English, the class has been reading more of *Boy in the Tower*. This week, they focused on colons and explored why the author has chosen to use them. They then rewrote parts of the story using colons. In maths, we have been looking at decimals. The class practised multiplying decimals by 10, 100, and 1,000, as well as adding decimals using the expanded and compact column methods.

## Year 6

This week in Y6, we had a very exciting week. It involved Masterchef Round 2, topic: pies. The winners were Coconut Cream Pie (by Kamille, Matilda, Spica, Ayin and Kiana)



and Jamaican Curry Pie (by Ahyun, Ziyuan, Joylin, Ariana and Maya) and everyone thought they were delicious! We

also had our public speaking competition, in which Kamille will be taking part for Y6. There were many other great speeches including Edie and Ahyun who were candidates as well. Miss Baxter has been teaching us more lessons as part of her training programme. Our class book *Gregor the Overlander* is getting more and more intense.
