We had a fantastic start to the week with a whole school assembly by Mike Mullen, the BMX world champion in half pipe. He talked to the children about his journey to success and positive growth mindset. Following the assembly Years 5 and 6 had some BMX workshops with him.

The BMX workshop was excellent and exciting. Mike was a great instructor and taught us many fun tricks. We learnt how to bike with no hands and jump off small ramps. He taught us how to do the *kan kan* and *nak nak* on a BMX bike. He also taught us about never giving up and a cool trick called *flearning*, which is when you fail and learn at the same time. Classroom News:

Reception

Our excellent start with the BMX assembly on Monday got Reception thinking. Not only were we inspired by the message of learning through failure, we also thought about how Mike Mullen, the BMX champion carried out his stunts. We experimented with rolling vehicles down ramps with different surfaces. We predicted what might happen if a vehicle rolled down a bumpy ramp or a smooth ramp and on which of these surfaces would it roll the furthest. We predicted, compared, tested and discussed results. Peregrine explained that "bumps make it really hard to go fast, smooth makes it go fast like the visitor (Mike Mullen) was fast when he jumped over the teachers."

Years 1 and 2

Key Stage One started the week excited to have a BMX expert in school, who thrilled the children with his incredible tricks and stunts. In Maths, Year 1 have been recapping one more and one less and then used number sentences to show their understanding of this. They then moved on to work out 2 more and 2 less. Year 2 completed their work on capacity by estimating how many litres different containers could hold, such as a saucepan, bucket, bowl and a bath. Year 2 have now moved on to recapping their number bonds/ facts to 10 and then applied this learning to their number bonds/ facts to 20. In English, we read the story of Dogger by Shirley Hughes and the class answered some comprehension questions using their retrieval and inference skills. The classes then created some "missing" posters, imagining that their favourite toy had gone missing. The Year 1s used descriptive language and the year 2s combined descriptive language with connectives to describe the appearance of their toys and also include when the toy was last seen. In Science, we have been looking at leaf damage and which insects and fungus' cause this. Well done for a very hard working week.

For all Year 2 parents, we have sent out an optional spelling practise sheet for your children. See attachment.

Just as a reminder to all parents in Key Stage One classes, next **Wednesday 30 November** is our toy Museum and it would be great if your child could bring in a toy from their parent or grandparent, if they haven't already, which will provide us with a range of different toys through the eras. Year 3

This week the children had an enjoyable trip to West Stow Anglo Saxon Village near Bury St Edmunds. They learnt what life might have



been like living through this period and enjoyed looking around the museum and the various re-enactments. In our History lessons the children learnt where the Saxons, Jutes and Angles first settled and enjoyed finding various Anglo Saxon place names using atlases and maps. In Maths lessons the children compared, added and subtracted millilitres and litres. Later on in the week they enjoyed finding the perimeter of 2D shapes. In Computer lessons the children enjoyed copying and pasting images for their reports on Roman Britain.

Year 4

This week, we kick-started our Anglo-Saxon topic by visiting West Stow Anglo-Saxon village. The children enjoyed exploring Anglo-Saxon style houses, handling some real artefacts and having their questions answered by an Anglo-Saxon expert. In Maths, we have been revising place value and challenging ourselves with problem solving activities while in English we finished our non-chronological reports by adding pictures and captions. In Science, we have been investigating how distance affects how we hear sound as well as how to change the pitch of a sound using everyday objects.

Year 5

Year 5 started the week off with an excellent Growth Mindset BMX workshop. They all challenged themselves and left with a sense of huge achievement by stepping outside of their comfort zone. In Maths this week Year 5 have looked at multiplication and division, finding common multiples, factors and deciding whether we need to round answers up or down in mental division problems. In English we have explored devises for creating cohesive writing. Using reports on migratory animals, we have looked at topic sentences, adverbials, conjunctions and pronouns and were able to apply these when changing notes into paragraphs that flowed and made sense. We're enjoying reading Goodnight Mr Tom and have explored the two main characters' personalities using retrieval and inference.

Year 6

This week in Maths, Year 6 learnt about multiplication and word problems. In RE, we learnt about refugees and made beautiful posters about them and how to help refugees. In Science, we tested a netball and basketball's air pressure. In English, we wrote a creative piece of writing in the first person, using ambitious vocabulary and dramatic words. By Danielle
