#### Classroom news:

## Reception

The cold weather this week has led to some very interesting learning as part of our Understanding of the World element of the Reception curriculum. Miss Blake left some plastic water toys in the water tray in the outside area, overnight. In the morning we found that the water had turned into ice! We used a thermometer to check the temperature of the water and found that it was in fact, 0 °C. This led us then to check the temperature of the water that comes from the cold water tap. The class knew the temperature had to be higher than 0 °C, as it wasn't frozen. It was in fact 14 °C. We then boiled the same water in a kettle, watching the steam come out of the kettle. We found that the water from the kettle, once poured out, was over 90 °C.

#### KS1

In English, all classes have finalised their storyboards, retelling the tale of The Gingerbread Man. We've continued using Talk4writing to help with retelling the story and adding in actions to help us with remembering it in preparation for our story writing next week. Year 1 thought about connections to extend their sentences and Year 2 used open noun phrases to make their sentences sound even more exciting. In Maths, Year 1s have been adding single digits to teen numbers and they also learnt that adding a smaller number to a greater number is easier to work out as you just have to count on from the larger number. Year 2 have been looking at measurement this week, thinking about weight in grams and kilograms and capacity, looking at millilitres and litres. They used scales and jugs to explore these forms of measurement. In History, we recapped The Gunpowder Plot and some of us

acted out each part and some of us reflected on what we had learnt. In Science, all classes have been exploring microhabitats and we all went outside looking for at least 4 different microhabitats and worked out what sort of minibeasts could be found. Lastly, in PE, all children have been finalising their routine, which combines a forwards roll, teddy bear roll, egg tuck roll, and back support. All e-books have been added to your child's Big Cat portal, so please do continue to read with them. Well done for a hardworking week KS1!

#### Year 3

Year 3 have worked really hard through the week. In Maths, the children have been adding and subtracting 1s 10s and 100s to 3-digits numbers (including number sentences that bridge the 100s). In our English lessons, we have started to recognise different features of non-chronological reports including titles, subtitles, paragraphs, captions and labels. In our History session, the children enjoyed comparing how we write today to how the Ancient Egyptians wrote. In Computing, the children enjoyed filming the storyboards that they had prepared previously, using iMotion.

#### Year 4

In Maths this week, we worked on 4-digit place value, division using a number line and some investigations linked to these areas. In English, we have been exploring lots of non-fiction books about Ancient Egypt in preparation for writing our own non-chronological report, using all the fascinating facts we have learned in History. We learnt about paragraphs and how to write a glossary. In Computing, we learnt how to write programs for light and temperature sensors and in PE we started working on a gymnastics routine inspired by Ancient Egypt. In Music, Year 4 created their own songs about Ancient Egypt and practised playing scales on xylophones to accompany their singing. Well done Year 4 for a very hard working week! Please find the Year 4 spellings attached.

Both Year 3 and 4 will be visiting the Fitzwilliam Museum on Wednesday during the school day.

#### Year 5

In English, we enjoyed writing short horror stories, inspired by the ones we read in Short! by Kevin Crossley-Holland. In Maths, we practised converting between grams and kilograms, millilitres and litres, miles and kilometres, and other imperial and metric units of measurement. In Science, we set up an investigation into whether different conditions affect the speed at which mould grows on bread. In PSHE, we learned when and how to seek urgent help from adults, including when the emergency services are required, and role played calling different emergency services.

#### Year 6

Year 6 Masterchef took place on Thursday this week. The winners were the Masterchef Masters (Noam, Filippos, Lucas and Gray) with a chocolate loaf, pictured here. The loaf received 4/5 for appearance and 5/5 for taste. Today, Year 6 went to St Mark's Church to learn about church features.

They also completed their swimming for the year, finishing it with a fun session. By Gray and Evi
