Classroom news

Reception

Even though it has been an especially warm week, Reception children have coped really well with the heat, and it has not stopped them from enjoying the outdoor area-hunting for insects and keeping cool at the water station and mud kitchen. In literacy, all children completed their storyboards, ready to be used for retelling the story of The Gigantic Turnip. In maths, we have been recapping number bonds to 10, as well as doubling and halving numbers from 5 to 10. In phonics, we have been looking at words that end in -er, such as printer, sleeper, and sweeter, and words that end in -est, such as clearest, brightest, and greenest. Reception have continued with their child-led projects on minibeasts, choosing to engage either outdoors or indoors at one of the many minibeast-themed stations-such as creating an insect out of playdough or minibeast number bonds to 10. Well done for a brilliant week, Reception!

Year 1

Year 1 has embarked on our geography project, comparing the place we live—Newnham—with a location beyond

Europe: Shanghai in China. We began the topic by exploring the difference between man-made and physical (natural) features in our local environment. To help us investigate, we went on a field trip from school to Lammas Land. Along the way, we identified mostly man-made features—buildings, roads, and bridges—with the main exception being the river. At Lammas Land, we had an interesting discussion: is it a man-made feature or a natural, physical one? What do you think?

Year 2

It's been another busy and productive week in Year 2! Alongside completing their end-of-year assessments, the children have been working hard on writing their very own superhero stories – full of imagination and creativity. In history, we've been learning about significant nurses from the past and comparing their important contributions. Meanwhile, in science, we've been exploring personal hygiene and discussing how we can keep ourselves healthy. A reminder that next week will be our final swimming session of the year – well done to all the children for their enthusiasm and progress in the pool!

Year 3

Year 3 has had another busy week. In maths, we started to look at calculating the volume of water in jugs with scales going up in different intervals. In English, the children really enjoyed writing their own expanded noun phrases to make their food sound more tempting. In science the children represented the data they had collected on a bar chart and drew conclusions on what they had discovered. In PSHE the children enjoyed discussing what contributed to having good personal hygiene.

Year 4

This week in maths, we have been looking at different methods for division and multiplication. In English, we have continued looking at how to use apostrophes for plural nouns. Our child led project this term is 'Healthy Me' and we have planned the research we'd like to do in groups. We have also completed some more assessments and started RSE lessons. Spellings this week are plural possessive nouns. Take care with those apostrophes!

Year 5

In maths, we revised adding and subtracting fractions with different but related denominators and then practised multiplying fractions and mixed numbers by whole numbers. In English, we discussed who stakeholders in different debates could be and why they might hold certain opinions. We then planned and performed short presentations about something that we think should be banned and why. On Wednesday, we spent the day doing different social skills activities, with a focus on dealing with conflict, personal space and boundaries, polite and balanced conversations and managing social changes. In science, we explored separation of different materials through sieving and filtration and designed a filtration system to clean dirty water.

Year 6

This week, we did our history projects about significant people who did cool things. We also did PSHE/science on drugs e.g. beer, vodka, cannabis, etc. We also talked about medicine. On Thursday we had a class sleepover and we were all very excited for it. In PE we have been preparing for Sports Day and we were practising our shotput and javelin skills. Don't worry. We were not using the pointy, metal javelins, therefore no child was harmed.
