Active Lives and Mental Wellbeing: Survey

Sport England has published findings from a survey of 130,194 pupils aged 5-16 across England examining their attitudes towards sport and physical activity. Findings relating to mental wellbeing, individual development and community development are included, such as: children and young people who reported as being active everyday were found to have a more positive sense of mental wellbeing compared with those who reported as less active; average levels of mental wellbeing decreased with age, from a rating of 7.9 out of 10 for 7- to 9year-olds to 6.2 for 13- to 16-year-olds.

Children's Loneliness

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) has published its inaugural report on children's loneliness in England and Great Britain. Analysis is drawn from interviews with children and

young people, the Community Life Survey 2016/17 and the Good Childhood Index Survey 2018. Key statistics include: 11.3 per cent of children said they were "often" lonely; 19.5 per cent of children living in a city reported "often" feeling lonely, compared with 5 per cent of those living in rural areas. Recommendations for avoiding loneliness include: joining in sports, clubs and activities; use of social media to maintain connections and develop new ones; purposefully reaching out and talking to people.

Autumn term round up

This term has been packed with lots of fundraising and exciting activities! We've run two of our year's biggest fundraising events this term - the fireworks night, and the Twilight Market and film night - as well as the PTA stalls at International Evening and the school disco, and been part of the Christmas Card Project (which raised £350!). It's been great to see lots of new faces helping out at the various events and to know that there are so many 'regulars' willing to pitch in time and again to make these events a success - thank you to everyone who has been involved this term. Your support makes a huge difference to the school community.

What we've raised

Through our events and treat stall fundraising, so far this term we've raised A MASSIVE £5,829.81 and there's still some more money to come from last minute Christmas sales!! Thank you all for your support! This term's fundraising efforts are all going towards a complete refurbishment of the school music room, so that there is a more welcoming and practical space for individual lessons and small group music work in the school.

What we funded

This term, using funds raised in the summer term, we've funded projects that had a value of over \pounds 5,500 for the school, including:

- new Design Technology cart for woodwork and other projects (see photo for some crafty things made using this equipment!)
- music subscriptions, enabling access to more singing and music in assemblies and music lessons
- new sets of learning resources dictionaries, atlases, and Oxford Reading Tree books for use across the school
- a new play cooker and sink for R/I
- new construction toys Lego and Stickle bricks for Reception
- a Mac Mini to enable school to better manage content on the (part-PTA funded!) iPads
- a new water butt for gardening club
- the annual anti-bullying workshop
- additional Forest Schools sessions for the whole school
