Classroom news

Reception

As part of our current topic on Journeys, Reception went to visit the local garage. We met Lee, one of the mechanics,



who showed us around his workspace, explaining about the work he carries out on customers' vehicles. It was very exciting to see the car he

working on being raised up on the lift, ready to be examined. Lee also showed us the engines on two very damaged cars and told us about how he became a mechanic; it took quite a long time to know everything he knows. When asked, many of our class liked the idea of being mechanics and fixing things in the future.

KS1

This week in maths, Year 2 students have been learning to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes. Year 1 has been exploring 2D and 3D shapes, experimenting with turning and positioning them. A highlight for KS1 was our field trip to Grantchester Meadows, where we explored the compelling question of whether houses should be built there. In English,

we have been crafting fact files on Henry VIII, and Year 1 students wrote great recounts of their trip. In art, KS1 students have been creating detailed drawings of flora and fauna, using a variety of mediums to bring their artwork to life. Science lessons this week involved labelling the parts of the body and explaining what their role is. Year 2 also wrote questions about the body. For PSHE, we celebrated the remarkable aspects of our bodies, writing about what makes them special. History this week saw KS1 students investigating photographs and paintings of Castle Hill, constructing timelines from past to present while using their growing historical vocabulary. Well done KS1, for a week filled with curiosity, creativity, and hard work!

Year 3

Year 3 has worked really hard throughout the week. In maths we have focused on telling the time using analogue, digital, 12hr and 24hr clock. A link to help your child learn the time has been included in the home learning section of our school website (see top right of newsletter for link). In English sessions, the children learnt how to use a range of personal pronouns to make their writing less repetitive and learnt when to use 'a' and 'an'. In geography, the children started National Fieldwork week by following a map of the school. In class the children used the 8 points on a compass to locate various features on an OS map. Towards the end of the week the children enjoyed learning about the importance of brushing their teeth in science.

Year 4

This week we have been reading a story called *The Seal Children* by Jackie Morris, and collecting memorable phrases we could use in our writing. In maths we have been looking at different written methods for multiplication and division and trying them out. Our multiplication facts have been very useful. In geography we have used compass points when looking at an OS map of our local area and enjoyed whole school outdoor mapwork activities for Fieldwork Fortnight. In DT we have designed our model using a pneumatic system. Don't forget to bring in a box. We have also thought about different body worries a child might have, and what advice we would give them. In science we have had an exciting time finding out about keeping teeth healthy. The attached spelling words to practise this week again contain the suffix —ous.

Year 5

In maths, we have been looking at timetables, especially train timetables, and how to calculate time intervals. We have done this through planning journeys, organising days based on how long different tasks take and how to calculate new arrival times after a delay. In English, we compared features of formal and informal letters and analysed some historical letters by Leonardo da Vinci and Captain Robert Scott. We began our RSE topic by learning to name both internal and external body parts.

Year 6

This week Year 6 have been prepping for the play which will take place on 27th June. We have also started making leaflet

for our history work about local history. On Thursday, we had one round of MasterChef with the theme of *International Pies*. We did really well and we had so much fun in Sketchup for computing.

Cambridgeshire Libraries Reading Challenge

As you may know, every Summer Cambridgeshire Libraries challenge children and young people aged 4 to 11 to read 6 books over the course of the Summer Holiday.
