Our A-team, captained by Rohan and Evan in alternate games, beat the Junior Chess & Go B-team  $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ , and thumped King's F  $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ . Our B-team demolished St Matthew's by a score of  $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  and defeated the Sancton Wood B-team  $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ . # Reception

#### **Classroom news**


Reception has spent this week preparing for Maisy's birthday party next Friday, which has been inspired by the story, Maisy's Birthday Party. Reception has been writing out invitations to one another; thinking about what food could be found at a birthday party; and counting all the candles on a birthday cake. In Phonics this week, Reception has reviewed some of their trickier digraphs this term, such as 'nk,' 'ng', 'th' and 'sh' including 'x' and 'w.' We've also recapped our trickier tricky words, "has" and "off." Reception also had the opportunity to join their first whole school council groups. Each group (Earth, Fire, Air and Water) discussed playtimes, the importance of wearing activewear and the Christmas postbox for sending Christmas cards. Well done for a fantastic week Reception.

#### Year 1

This week the children in Year 1 have been making shadow puppets linked to our science work. They first of all looked at the properties of different materials, sorting them into those that were opaque, those that were transparent and those that were translucent. Based on this, they had to choose the relevant material that would let enough light through or block light to create a shadow on the theatre screen.

# Year 2

This week has been busy and exciting! We've begun rehearsals for our Christmas Concert. In English, the children practiced using imperative verbs and time connectives to improve their instruction writing. In maths, we explored 2D shapes and symmetry. In history, we compared how teddy bears have changed over time, examining their features. In art, the children created



fantastic carbon monoprints using carbon copy paper, showcasing their impressive mark-making skills. Well done on a great week, Year 2!

#### Year 3

This week Year 3 has been focusing on length in maths. They learnt to draw, measure, compare and order lengths in millimetres and centimetres. In English the children enjoyed writing their own stories based on *Strict* by Michael Rosen. In DT this week, the children worked in groups to make the castles they had previously designed. In history the children were treated to an Anglo-Saxon calligraphy workshop.

#### Year 4

It's been another exciting week for year 4! We were very lucky to have a visit from a calligraphy expert who showed us how to use Anglo Saxon lettering. We also had a DT day to make our castle models. They look great. In English we have started looking at *Grimwood* by Nadia Shireen. We have thought about characters and what might happen next. In maths we have been using the grid method for multiplication. Our science experiments let us see the vibrations that make sound. For spelling this week we have been looking at words ending in -ch/-tch.

# Year 5

In maths, we practised reading transport timetables using the 24-hour clock and calculating time intervals. We then learned how to calculate the perimeter of rectangles and composite shapes and the area of rectangles and irregular shapes. In science, we designed an experiment into which condition causes mould to grow fastest on bread, focusing on the independent, dependent and control variables. In PSHE, we discussed self-esteem and the things we are good at.

#### Year 6

In Year 6 this week we have organised a game of Secret Santa. We've also been planning our next round of MasterChef! In maths, we have been working on coordinate grids and shapes. We are enjoying reading our book *Goodnight Mister Tom*, although it is a bit sad.
