Firstly, Mrs Laughlin and I had our meeting to look at attendance last week and were really impressed with the improvements in attendance rates. There were only 7 children whose attendance was below the 85% cut-off we use at this time of year, which is a big improvement on our previous data.

Even the group of children with below-90% attendance, which is our expectation in the spring term, was much smaller than usual too. So, thank you for your efforts and keep up the good work.

Classroom news

Reception

With our topic on *Celebrations*, Reception has completed lots of activities around this theme. As part of Active Learning, all children were given the opportunity to decorate Maisy's birthday

cake, from the story book *Maisy's Birthday Party*, using colourful beaded strings, pebbles, flowers, leaves and little lights. Mrs

Marroncelli discussed with the class all the things that they would expect to have at a birthday party, such as the food and games. In Phonics, Reception has looked at the diagraphs: 'sh,' 'th,' 'ng' and 'nk' and the tricky words: "she," "he," "of" and "go." As part of their Guided Writing, we've started



using our Literacy books to write out CVC words using taught graphemes. In maths, we've been looking at repeating patterns and during Active Learning, lots of children chose to use the Numicon to create repeated patterns. We finished the week with our final Forest School of this term and despite the weather being quite chilly, all children were able to listen carefully to the sounds around them and then create dens and explore the surrounding trees. Well done Reception for a fantastic week!

Year 1

As cross-curricular а activity for R.E. and science, the children in Year 1 made Christingles to mark the celebration of the same name. The R.E included aspect understanding what the Christingle represents for with Christians, the orange signifying the earth, the red ribbon the blood of Jesus and the sweets the fruits of the earth. A candle is added to symbolise the light that Jesus represents for



Christians. For the science aspect, the class has been looking at how the senses are a very important part of all celebrations, from the food we taste, to the lights we see and the smells we enjoy.

Year 2

This week in Year 2 we have been consolidating our doubling and halving and looking at how these facts work together and enjoying a problem solving game with dice (you could ask your child to teach you this at home). In English we have been looking at lots of instructions and seeing what they have in common. The children tried following different instruction texts to see what parts were the most helpful. In science we have been grouping animals according to their diet. Art this week was an introduction to carbon printing and in history we were comparing old and new toys. It's been a great week full of hands-on tasks and we enjoyed our no pencil Wednesday with lots of oracy activities!

Year 3

Year 3 has had another really busy week. The highlight was our trip to The Anglo Saxon Village at West Stowe. The children saw some of the artefacts that were uncovered at the site and were able to get first hand experience of what living through this period might have felt like. Thank you to all of the parents who helped us on our trip. In maths, the children represented data using bar charts and were able to work out how much more/fewer sugar some fizzy drinks contained than others. In our English lessons the children started to plan a poem inspired by *Strict* by Michael Rosen.

Year 4

What an exciting week for year 4! We have been looking at where invaders such as Angles, Saxons and Jutes came from and



why they came to Britain. Followed of course by a trip to the Anglo-Saxon Village at West Stow where we experienced what life would have been like living in Anglo-Saxon times. In English we have been trying out conjunctions to make sentences longer and writing our own poetry. In maths we have been finishing work on line graphs and time intervals plus a times tables rock stars inter-house tournament. For spelling this week we have been looking at words ending in –Ily.

Year 5

In maths, we finished our multiplication and division topic by using the vertical chunking method for dividing and deciding whether to round remainders up or down depending on context. We then began our measures and data topic by converting between millilitres and litres and miles and kilometres. In English, we began our new topic on travel writing and explored various travel writing texts, identifying their features. In science, we learned about bacteria, how it spreads and how it differs from other living things. In PSHE, we discussed cyberbullying, what it can look like and what to do if we see it happening.

Year 6

This week, there was No-Pen Day where schools don't use pens to help children with their oracy skills. In English, Year 6 made puppets to create a scene from a book and performed it to help with acting out loud.

On Tuesday, Ms Wakelen did an assembly about her trip around some parts of the world and helped an orangutan charity. For 5

days, she worked with sunbears and made food for them because she can't work with the orangutans yet as they could get chest infections. On her last day working there she got to go on a boat around the islands where some of the orangutans lived. By Bethany and Miriam
