# **Classroom news:**

# Reception

The first week of being full time has been very exciting, with lots of new things to experience. The class have had lunch in hall, enjoying the tasty meals that our school chef Ms Noble, and her team create daily. They also have had their first taste of P.E. at school when we played games, where good listening skills for following instructions are needed. Thank you to all the parents who were able to attend the Early Years Curriculum workshop. The presentation that was used during the workshop is accessible on the school website under the Parents tab/Workshops.

# Years 1 and 2

This week, KS1 began their DT project by designing a windmill. They drew on all the features, such as a door and window and coloured in their roofs. In English, the children have been applying their understanding of similes. As an extension to this, Year 2 included adjectives to their simile sentences to describe their emotions based on the story, What makes me, a me? In Maths, Year 1s have been ordering and counting numbers to ten and 20. They also counted in 10s and used a number grid to 100 to work out what the missing numbers are. In Year 2, the children have been working on Website links:

their place value of 2-digit numbers, by working out the value of tens and ones in numbers, such as 57. In Geography, all classes created a messy map by using objects from around the classroom to represent chairs and tables. In Science, all children experimented with balloons to see what happens to their shape when squeezed, twisted, stretched and bent. Lastly, in PE all children practised doing a variety of jumps using the mats. We'd like to remind all parents that your child's book from their Reading sessions this week have been uploaded to the Big Cat Collins e-book portal, so please ensure you're reading with them and if you have any issues logging in, please let us know.

# Year 3

This week, Year 3 have finished their unit on place value. In class, we looked at how to write different sums of money in pounds and used inequality sentences to compare amounts. In our English sessions, the children enjoyed writing their own versions of I'll Take you to Mrs Cole by Michael Foreman. In our Geography sessions, the children learnt how different volcanoes are formed and enjoyed researching where to find active, dormant and extinct volcanoes in the world. In our Science sessions, the children learnt about different rock types. The children had lots of fun in art experimenting with different textures.

# Year 4

In English, we have planned our own version of The Iron Man and started to practise writing in the style of Ted Hughes to describe our own character. Calian wrote: 'Taller than the Shard, The Diamond Dog stood at the top of the embassy'. In Maths, we worked more on place value with 4-digit numbers and answered some problem-solving questions. We also practised reading timetables and drawing number lines to work out time intervals crossing the hour. In PE, we practised the techniques needed to perform a squat or straddle jump on to a vaulting box. We explored hot and cold colours using watercolours in Art and Design. This week's spellings for home learning are attached.

# Year 5

In English, we explored different types of travel writing, including adventure writing and comic writing. In Maths, we converted between equivalent fractions and decimals and used our place value knowledge to use tenths and hundredths in both fraction and decimal form. In History, we had a class debate to decide whether it was preferable to live in ancient Athens or Sparta and whether our own interests or gender impacted our decision.

## Year 6

This week we have been focusing on performing and reading poems eg The Highwayman. In our topic Ancient Greece, we have been learning about their life and comparing it to our own. We have also just started our restaurant Tip Top Temple, and have been sorting out the bookings. In Maths, we have been looking at finding difference. *By Charlotte and Dunya*
