Classroom news

Reception

Reception has worked very hard this week. They continued with their learning of initial sounds by exploring the phonemes; i, n, m and d. Some of the children chose to use their active learning to practise mark making these graphemes. In maths, all children helped our class puppet, Mr Muddles the mole, with counting up to 10 using number cards. The children used subitising to help them work out which numbers Mr Muddles had left out. In PE, as we prepare to use the balance bikes, all children practised their balancing skills. We also introduced more junk modelling. If parents have more cardboard (no bigger than a cereal box), and plastic bottles that they are happy to donate to Reception, we'd be more than happy to take those off of your hands. Well done for a great week Reception! We are very proud of how well you're all settling in.

Year 1

Over the past few weeks, Year 1 has been finding out about the enjoyment and function of books with moving parts. They have been looking at how sliding mechanisms are



constructed and have designed and created moving pictures for the nursery rhyme *Humpty Dumpty*. They have been creating the books for the younger children in Newnham Nursery and are looking forward to sharing them next week.

Year 2

This week in maths, we've been using number bonds to ten to figure out how many we need to count to reach the next multiple of ten. We've also been practising adding and subtracting ten with the help of a hundred square. In English, the children have worked hard to learn the actions and words for our traditional tale, *The Three Little Pigs*. We've also been sequencing the events of the story using a storyboard. In DT, we've continued working in teams of three to create our moving storybooks. In computing, we roleplayed as supermarket tills and discussed the benefits of information technology. In science, we've been learning to identify and compare the suitability of everyday materials. In geography, we've been investigating daily weather patterns. Well done for a fantastic week, Year 2! Please remember to bring your reading book on Wednesday.

Year 3

Year 3 has worked incredibly hard throughout the week. In maths they have learnt to find missing numbers using the inverse operation (_______ + 8 = 39) and use known number facts to help us add 1-digit numbers to 2 and 3-digit numbers (48+5=53, 178+5=183). In English, the children enjoyed listening to *Stone Age Boy* by Satoshi Kitamura. The children enjoyed writing questions to him and thinking about how he might answer them. Later on in the week the children wrote descriptions of some of the settings found in the story. In science the children enjoyed discovering what soil is made of. In history we started to look at the Bronze Age and think about what some of the artefacts that have been recovered are and what they tell us about the people who lived during this time.

Year 4

Well done Year 4 for another hard working week. In English we have organised our favourite facts about the stone age into paragraphs. In maths we have revised the eight times table facts that we learnt in year 3, ready to start work on the 7s and 12s. This would be a good time to practise the 8s at home to make sure you have quick recall. In science we have been trying out different classification keys for minibeasts to decide which ones work best. In art we have planned a 3d model based on our class story, considering shapes, colours and backgrounds. For spelling this week we have been looking at words beginning with the prefix sub- as well as revising words from Year 1/2. Please see the attached list of spelling words.

Year 5

In English, we began our new topic, focusing on the book *I Like this Poem* (edited by Kaye Webb). We discussed what types of poetry we enjoy and began to explore some of the poems in the anthology. We then had a go at learning a poem by heart and performing it. In maths, we practised adding and subtracting numbers to two decimal places, using the counting on method. We really enjoyed our trip to Bletchley Park on Thursday and were also lucky enough to have a kind parent come in earlier in the week to talk about the technology from WW2 that led to the development of some of our current technology.

Year 6

This week we have been starting to plan our Masterchef competition. We got into groups and started exploring recipes that were savoury and use a rising agent. We've been working through the Year 5 and 6 spellings and thinking about ways to help learn them by looking at their etymology, syllables, phonemes and spelling patterns. In science we made booklets about the lifecycle of birds, which we shared with Year 1. *By Khalil, Adam and Patrick*

Yesterday, Year 5 and 6 visited Bletchley Park as part of their WWII learning. We learnt about encryption using the Enigma and how it was used to communicate during the war. We even had a go at using it! We tried having a go at cracking some simpler codes before finding out how many coding combinations the enigma machine could create



158,962,555,217,826,360,000! We found out how the clever coders worked in secret to try to solve ciphers used by the Nazis and the breakthroughs of Turing and others.
