Dear Parents and Carers,

This week, we all learnt a little about the beliefs of the Bahai faith in Thursday's assembly - a message of unity and looking for what makes us similar, which is always such an apposite message.

As you can read below, the children have been busy expanding their minds, sometimes with a practical application (in KS1 science, they have been preparing for the wetter months by looking at what materials are waterproof!).

The school has been a little emptier with the Year 6 children ensconced in Norfolk, enjoying their residential trip to Hilltop. This has meant an opportunity for the Year 5 children to fulfil some of the Year 6 roles and responsibilities, which they have done brilliantly (and enjoyed – especially the simple pleasure of sitting on the benches in assembly).

In other news, several parents and members of staff have mentioned a building friction between parents in cars and those who use bicycles/walk during morning drop-off. Please could I ask that we all try and channel a bit of the Bahai teachings? The list of things that we all share (children at the school; wanting to get them there on time; busy lives and **always** busy mornings; occasional disasters that throw the morning routine out of the window) is surely a longer list than the differences that seem to be causing conflict (mainly, driving versus walking).

We would ask that, if you drive, please try and park somewhere away from Chedworth Street. This still applies even if the morning has been a bit chaotic or if traffic has got in the way and you have to arrive late. As long as it's not a regular occurrence, the school completely understands that life with small children can sometimes go awry. If you have you no other option other to park on Chedworth Street, then we would ask that you limit your speed to 5mph or less, especially if you can see the street is full of pedestrians. A little patience as the pedestrians move out of the way would also be well received.

Equally, if you are a pedestrian, please be aware that for many of our parents there is more than one child to get to more than one school. We have a parent who drops at a secondary school 18 miles away due to not being able to find a place at a school in the city. Whilst all the parents who drive make efforts to park elsewhere, there will be occasions when they don't have that choice. If you are chatting in the middle of the road (which is obviously a lovely thing to be able to do) and a car comes along, a friendly smile and stepping aside seems more likely to be well received and have a more positive effect than anything confrontational or disapproving.

It is down to all of us to be both understanding and considerate. As the excellent quote says: be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle (especially if they have young children*).

Finally, we are conscious of the amount of emails that are sent out and have decided to try and limit the amount of 'pings' cluttering your inbox. As a result, we are going to trial attaching all class messages/letters/requests etc. to the weekly newsletter (there is one concerning the KS1 choir attached to this one). Obviously, there will still be some that have to go out at different times, and it will take time for us to figure out exactly how this works, but it should definitely reduce the quantity of messages we send out.

However, this also means that we are relying on you to check the newsletter each week. We will endeavour to title the messages clearly, so you can see which ones apply to you, but parents will need to be conscientious (and possibly remind each other) to stay on top of things.

Classroom News:

Reception

We have started the teaching of phonics this week with our new scheme, 'Little Wandle'. We are looking forward to sharing more with you about this at our curriculum workshop on Wednesday 28th September at 9.15am, in the hall or via Zoom at 6pm. We have also started the teaching of maths and have been learning to count accurately and working on recognising numerals. Mrs Marroncelli talked to the class about Harvest and we thought about reasons to be thankful. This week, parents in Reception will have received an invitation to join Class Dojo. Please do ensure you join us online so that you can see photographs and more information about our current learning.

Years 1 and 2

In English, we are starting to focus on some of the features of fairy tales. We read the Gingerbread Man story, acted it out in a group and answered some questions about it. In Phonics and Reading, Year 1 are recapping Phase 3 phonemes and Year 2 are learning the Phase 5 phonemes and alternative sounds through the Little Wandle scheme. In Maths, Year1 have been investigating teen numbers and learning about ordinal numbers. Year 2 have been learning about partitioning 2-digit numbers into tens and ones and how to write place value addition and subtraction number sentences. In Science, we tested whether certain materials are waterproof and we practised different balances in gymnastics. Thank you in advance for helping your child to practise reading their ebook (decoding, prosody and comprehension) on a daily basis and please send your child's completed reading log in to school on Mondays and Fridays, so they can be awarded their reading at home certificates as soon as possible.

Year 3

Year 3 have worked really hard throughout the week. In maths, we have continued to focus on place value. The children learnt how to write amounts in pounds and pence (£1.04 and £1.40) and compared these using the < and > signs. In English lessons, the children enjoyed listening to Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura and used their story boards to retell the story in the correct sequence. In spelling sessions, the children enjoyed creating spelling pyramids to help them learn the tricky parts of each of this week's spelling words. In computing, the children enjoyed uploading images

onto their slides and selecting ways of transitioning from one slide to another. In our history lessons we continued to focus on the stone-age and what a people who lived during this period might have needed to have near them to survive.

Year 4

This week in Year 4, we have been writing stories set in the Stone Age and have started a new book in English, *Stone Age Boy*. In maths, we have been doing subtraction by counting up on a number line to find the difference between two numbers and comparing this to other methods. In science, we have been creating our own classification keys to sort animals by their characteristics. In PSHE, we have been thinking about why it is important that our comments about the physical appearance of others should be positive and kind.

Year 5

This week in Year 5 we have finished reading the book, A Medal for Leroy by Michael Morpurgo, where secrets within the plot were revealed. Through our connections with the characters involved, we were able to empathise with their experiences of the First World War and understand the motives behind their behaviours. We began looking at Fractions and Decimals in Maths, working to multiply and divide numbers with 2 decimal places by 10 and 100. We set out to test whether we could clone a chrysanthemum in Science by carefully taking a cutting and hoping roots will grow. Within spelling lessons we've looked at strategies for learning to spell words with 'silent' letters such as autumn, honest, numb and write.

Year 6

We are writing this live (on Friday morning) from the Hilltop archery range where our group are practising our Catniss Evergreen/Robin Hood impressions. Yesterday, we did the assault course and the massive, free-fall, air jump which was really scary but really fun! Speaking of Catniss Evergreen, the game we played in the forest last night (Owls and Mice) felt like the Hunger Games (in a fun way). Our time has also been spent doing the super swing (which Erik described as his soul leaving his body) and climbing a huge climbing wall. So far, we have had lasagne and fish and chips for dinner; both were pretty good. At the moment, one of our groups is on the beach learning about coastal erosion. So far, Hilltop has been extremely exciting, scary and fun and we've still got a day to go before we come back on Saturday.
